

#### **Council of Governments**

**25.** California Governor's Presentation for Proposition 1 and CARE Court Receive a presentation from the California Governor's office about Proposition 1 and Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment Court.

### **A New Tool for Cities**

- For the first time, entities other than counties can petition the court directly to help a person with untreated psychosis receive treatment and housing, including:
  - Families and roommates;
  - Mayor's offices, first responders, homeless outreach coordinators; and
  - Licensed behavioral health professionals, local hospital directors, among others.

## **CARE Act Progress**

ALL County CARE Courts are operational as of December 1, 2024.


CalHHS, DHCS, and Judicial Council continue to:

- Work closely with <u>operators</u> Courts, counties, legal representation, and others - including support for data, engagement, and treatment and housing to CARE respondents.
- Work closely with <u>new petitioners</u> like families, mayors, and first responders, who have no other way to start treatment - including outreach and training through NAMI (families and selfadvocates), California Medical Association, and more

# **Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Act**

- 'Upstream' diversion to prevent more restrictive conservatorships or incarceration.
- CARE is a new civil court process, that can be supported and served by existing programs.
- **Provides** behavioral health services to **severely ill, vulnerable individuals** while preserving **self-determination** to the greatest extent possible.
- Serves individuals who have schizophrenia spectrum or other psychotic disorders who meet certain health and safety criteria.
- Designed so people can stabilize, begin healing, and exit homelessness.









## **CARE Eligibility Criteria**

- 18+ with a diagnosis of Schizophrenia Spectrum or Other Psychotic Disorders
- Symptoms severe in degree and persistent in duration, which may cause behavioral functioning that interferes substantially with primary activities of daily living (i.e., basic activities related to personal care), and may result in inability to maintain stable adjustment and independent functioning without treatment, support, and rehabilitation for a long or indefinite period of time
- Not stabilized with ongoing voluntary outpatient treatment

CalHHS

- Unlikely to survive safely and independently in the community (i.e., maintaining personal safety, hygiene, diet, health, and/or necessary relationships without supervision) and the condition is deteriorating OR services and support are needed to prevent relapse or deterioration
- Participation in CARE Act is the least restrictive alternative, AND
- The person will likely benefit from participating in a CARE plan or CARE agreement





#### Reminders

CalHHS

- 1. The goal of filing a petition is to ensure the respondent can get the help they need, so you don't need to worry about making it perfect.
- 2. The form is going to be read by a person (a judge), so just provide enough information to convey why the judge should ask county behavioral health to investigate further.
- 3. The person completing the form needs to make clear how the respondent may meet the CARE criteria. The forms may seem long, but the key eligibility information comes from one question on each form: question #5 (CARE-100) and #7 (CARE-101). You only need to put the eligibility information in one form.
- 4. It's ok to copy/paste or repeat information throughout the form.
- 5. If you have evidence of two 5250s (one within 60 days), you can attach that and only submit the CARE-100.
  - Evidence can include information from EHR, discharge paperwork, or a signed declaration from the petitioner if the petitioner had personal knowledge of the detentions.
- 6. CARE is not a last resort, if you think someone may be eligible, you can still file a petition
