Dial-a-Ride Now Offers Same Day Booking

Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) is partnering with the **RideCo app** to make booking rides easier. Riders can request a dial-a-ride trip through the app rather than just over the phone.

It allows passengers to make same day reservations—similar to microtransit. (Previously, reservations had to be made a day ahead.)

Participating agencies include Camarillo Area Transit, Valley Express and Thousand Oaks Transit.

Confused About the Difference Between Carpool Lanes and Express Lanes?



Southern California is home to a network of hundreds of miles of carpool lanes, as well as Express Lanes.

While the two are similar—they're designed to allow people who use them to travel faster—there are a few key differences you need to know.

• Carpool lanes (designated as HOV, or high occupancy vehicle. lanes) are free for users who meet posted occupancy requirements. That's usually two people per vehicle, but sometimes three.

• Express Lanes allow motorists including solo drivers—to use the lanes for a toll. However, 3+ (and sometimes 2+) person carpools can use the lanes for free or at a discount. A transponder set to the number of people in the vehicle is required.
